Dear Mr. Seham:

This is a final response to your 6 February 2015 Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request, received in the office of the Information and Privacy Coordinator on 19 February 2015, for **copies of the following documents:**

1. All documents, including but not limited to, letters, emails, interviews, and field agent notes regarding FedEx pilot [REDACTED] alleged claim that a perpetrator in the September 11, 2001 attack on the World Trade Center rode on his jumpseat from California to Memphis, Tennessee earlier in 2001. This was reported to Captain Mark Estabrook in his capacity as the FedEx Pilots Association Security Committee Chairman shortly after 9-11. Captain Estabrook then reported the claim to an FBI agent in Memphis, Tennessee. A subsequent FBI interview was conducted with the original reporting pilot.
2. All documents, investigation materials, reports, emails, recordings, media and other materials related to the boarding of FedEx aircraft in the days, weeks and months prior to and after 9-11 by Mahamed Atta, other Al Qaida members, suspects, actors, perpetrators or members of other terrorist organizations, including but not limited to FBI field agent notes and recorded interviews of all reporting FedEx pilots.
3. All investigative reports, materials, history, notes, media, emails, studies and correspondence related to the events surrounding the discovery of two "printer bombs" on separate UPS and FedEx flights in Dubai, United Arab Emirates on October 29, 2010. Please include any information related to previous shipments made in the days, weeks and months prior to the discovery of the UPS and FedEx printer bombs of October 29, 2010, from Ibrahim al-Asiri, or his agents in Yemen, to locations in the United States. Of special interest is the bomb plotters' interest in and utilization of online and real time flight tracking data for the purpose of setting timing in cell phone detonator devices found within the printer bombs.
4. All documents, correspondence, emails, recordings, media and other communications sent from agents of the United States government to and from UPS and FedEx executives and management representatives regarding the printer bomb incidents of October 29, 2010.

5. All documents, investigation materials, reports, emails, recordings, media and materials for the period of time from 1994 to 2009 inclusive, relating to Auburn Calloway's attack on FedEx Flight 705 crewmembers on April 7, 1994, including but not limited to his possible connection with any other terrorist attacks, plots or perpetrators.
6. All documents, investigation materials, reports, emails, recordings, media and materials for the period of time from 2010 to the present, relating to Auburn Calloway's attack on FedEx Flight 705 crewmembers on April 7, 1994, including but not limited to his possible connection with any other terrorist attacks, plots or perpetrators.
7. All documents, investigation materials, reports, emails, recordings and materials related to Auburn Calloway's possible conversion to Islam before or during his incarceration.
8. All documents, investigation materials, reports, emails, recordings, media and other materials related to the boarding of FedEx aircraft in the days, weeks and months prior to and after 9-11 by suspicious FedEx employees as reported by FedEx pilots.
9. All documents, investigation materials, reports, emails, recordings, media and other materials related to known intercepted bombs or improvised explosive devices discovered on or prevented from being placed on FedEx and UPS aircraft.

Please note, the mission of the Central Intelligence Agency is primarily concerned with foreign intelligence -- not domestic -- matters. Section 103 (d)(1) of the National Security Act, as amended, specifically provides that "the Agency shall have no police, subpoena, law-enforcement powers, or internal security functions." Executive Order 12333, which regulates the conduct of intelligence activities in the United States and elsewhere, provides that the responsibility for domestic intelligence collection is generally within the province of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. A very limited exception to the Order is provided that permits other agencies within the Intelligence Community to collect significant foreign intelligence and counterintelligence, provided that no such effort shall be undertaken for the purpose of acquiring information about the domestic activities of United States persons.
